Dive Report: Duckenfield 28th Jan

Duckenfield Dive 28 January 2024

Divers: Ross di Bartolo, Jeannene Moore, Mark Kerr, Bruce Spry

Weather was slightly overcast and I expected a southerly blowing up in the afternoon so we were watching the southern horizon to see how fast it was arriving. The journey to Long Reef was pretty quick taking about an hour. With slight southerly waves behind us.

Arriving at Long Reef there were a few fishing boats camped out east of the point but we headed slightly further north to the marks in the GPS. A bit confusing as an historic wreck is shown slightly south of the club's mark so I motored over the club mark and found nothing but sandy bottom. Another pass to the south still didn't bring up anything identifiable as the wreck. If you are over the top of the engine or boiler they show up as quite a sharp jump up on the sounder. Turned north again and this time a sudden jump in the bottom profile told me we were directly over the engine. The club mark is spot on.

Ross dropped the anchor and he and Jeannene geared up and dropped into the water. We kept the dive to 30 mins so we didn't get caught in the southerly and they both surfaced on time. Visibility was good although not crystal clear with the engine standing up about 10 metres south of the anchor. Mark and I geared up and hit the water. Again I was happy we got within 10m of the wreck with the anchor as the last time I dived this wreck some 10 years ago with Ross we had a long swim from the anchor to find the wreck.

We headed back to the Harbour and the southerly was picking up with waves up to 1.5m hitting us head on. It took about 2 hours to motor back to Tunks Park and a quick coffee at Clontarf saw us back at the ramp by 2:00pm for a wash and dry out.

The Duckenfield is one of those wrecks that is worth returning to occasionally. Over the time I've dived it I've seen a lot of change. I've dived this wreck in 2005,2010 and 2024. My first dives showed the engine parts clearly and the boiler was mostly intact although sitting out of its position on the ship. Now there is much more growth on the engine that its getting more difficult to distinguish the parts from each other. Particularly the fly wheel on the side of the engine block.

Some history of the Duckenfield and its fate:

History:

The Duckenfield was a collier built in May 1875 by J & W Dudgeonnd and owned by J & A Brown - coal merchants, Newcastle, NSW.

Built in May, 1875 it struck Long Reef on 24 May 1889

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The Master at the time of the wrecking was Thomas Hunter

Wreck Incident:

The Duckenfield struck the lee side of Long Reef 1.5 cables north of Long Point boat ramp enroute to Sydney from Newcastle. There was a moderate southerly and poor visibility. The crew of 14 abandoned ship within 10 minutes while the vessel still lay on the reef. The donkeyman, James Struthers, was drowned in the process but the remainder of the crew were soon picked up by the SS Hawkesbury and taken to Sydney. Captain Hunter immediately returned on board the Pilot steamer Captain Cook as he perceived that the vessel might drift off the reef. When they arrived there was no sign of the ship.

A week after the event two masts were discovered exposed 8 feet above the water. Rough weather intervened and the masts disappeared for 2 months. Captain Melvey of the tug steamer Grand buoyed a single mast. Captain John Hall and his team then began salvage operations which lasted over a year. The operations were interrupted and finally abandoned because of pressures to undertake salvage on more recent casualties - including the Royal Shepherd of which Captain Hunter was again the master.

Cargo and Salvage

The ships cargo included 285 tons of coal, 50 tons of coke and 50 tons of copper ingots. The ship was not insured.

Copper was partly recovered by Biggs and May under command of Captain John Hall. 10-18 tons left behind. Ships lower mast towed into Watson's Bay by Pilot steamer Captain Cook.

We all arrived, geared up, and headed to the Entry point at 9am. There was a swell coming in. Once we were in the water and settled, the dive proceeded.

Starting off we went anti-clockwise around the chain. Some parts of the chain were difficult to find. There was a noticeable current too. Dive time 60 minutes. Our Exit point was the same location as the entry. During our dive time, the tide had come in, so there was more drama for our exit. The support crew had to jump into action along with two life savers. We all had a rough time on exit. NO broken bones, fins, masks or cameras. Only one lost camera video light. So Poseidon can see in the dark (if he turns the light on).

Following the dive, we had a social catch up over near the surf club. The Club were having a fund-raising day. The Bacon & Egg Rolls, and Sausage Sandwiches were great. So too the Coffees/Teas from the Cafe. We found a shade spot under a tree to recount the mornings adventure, to discuss our plans for Christmas and travel plans for 2024.

Dive report - Little Manly Cove, Sunday 21 January 2024

On Sunday 21 January, a group of RUC members met for a morning dive at Little Manly Cove.

After checking www.beachwatch.nsw.gov.au that it was safe to swim, Brett, Jeannene, Richard, and Diego got ready to dive, with Noel as surface assistant. We arrived before 7:30am to secure parking, and that was wise since parking was nearly non-existent by that time.

Everybody managed to find a parking spot, Richard even carried a trolley to take his gear from the car to the dive site. The beach already started to have swimmers, including a water-polo team with their floating goals. We entered near the shark net, dodged the water-polo team, and started the dive. With all the gloomy news about water quality from the media, visibility was better than expected at 4-5 metres. Water temperature was a balmy 22 degrees.

We inspected the nets, where Richard found a tiny red critter, see photos. We then turned right, following the shore on our left. The bottom was sandy with the occasional rock or cluster of kelp. We found several fish lines and bait, and quite a few golf balls. Marine residents included a few goatfish, a lonely blue groper, the occasional octopus and cuttlefish. On the way back, by the nets, we heard the sound of swimmers plunging into water. Nearby, Diego saw something red trickling from the sea bottom. Something dropped by the swimmers? If it was blood, there was no fish activity nearby.

Back on shore, the beach was packed with swimmers, and there was a queue to order at the cafe. Thanks to Noel we had a shady spot next to the cafe where we enjoyed our coffee and biscuits.




Dive report - Malabar Long Bay, Sunday March 3rd 2024





Crazy night divers: 17th Feb

Photo Competition Rules

- 1. All RUC members are eligible to enter the competition.
- 2. A current financial RUC member must have taken the photo.
- 3. The entrant must be the creator of the image.
- 4. The entrant must own the copyright of the image.
- 5. The photographer grants Ryde Underwater Club Inc. publishing permission to reproduce the images in the Ryde Underwater Club Inc. website, club magazine (Surface Interval), Face Book page and in material promoting the club.
- 6. The photo was taken between 17th Nov 2023 and 24th May 2024
- 7. The photo is received before 24th May 2024 by the Committee
- 8. The photo is provided in electronic format:
- 9. JPEG format preferred.
- 10. Image size should be minimum of 3000 pixels by 2000 pixels and a maximum size of 4000 by 3000 pixels. Larger images may be accepted but will be re-sized to be consistent with all other entries.
- 11. File name includes initials of photographer, location and date it was taken, e.g. Nudibranch_John_Smith_Colours_2103-05-09.jpg•
- 12. Some additional information about the photo (e.g. location and give your photo a title)
- 13. The photo does not necessarily have to be an underwater shot, but be diving related.
- 14. RUC members are invited to provide up to 5 photos (the first 5 photos received will be included but addition photos will be discarded)
- 15. Points will be awarded to each image based on place voted by each member voting (i.e. 5 points for 1st place, 4 points for 2nd etc)
- 16. Entry with the most points is the winner (in case of draw, the photo with the most voters is the winner)
- 17. The decision of the committee will be final and no discussion entered into regarding the winning entry.

The winner will become the proud caretaker of the Golden Camera until the next competition. So, start putting aside your best shots aside for the photo comp.
