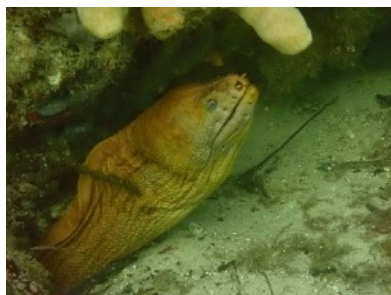

Water temp was 22 degrees and the viz was average but lots of fish life to be seen, with huge moray eel, catfish lurking by and giant Jew fish whizzing around. Dive time was 67 mins.

Dive and Club Report Highlights

Camp Cove, March 23

The keen RUC'ites who entered the water at 7:40 were: Alex Bartlett, Michael & Mathew Persson, Dave Wood, Malcolm Wright & myself with Liz Wright as topside support.

We snorkelled out to the closest marker pile & submerged to continue on the same bearing till we hit the reef that runs parallel to the shore.

This reef is a small table top reef at 4-5m depth that only sticks out from the silt by 20-40cm but is extensively undercut that makes a good night dive but today didn't seem to offer much variety apart from tarwhine, fan belted leatherjackets, goat fish & hingebeaked shrimp.

Dave & Malcolm opted to return just before we got to the Western end of the reef which is a pity as that's when I thought things got better, we passed an abandoned wheelie-bin & continued West towards Green Point.

Green Point is the Western headland of Camp Cove it is also known as Laings Point on some maps/charts but I've only known it as Green Point in all the years I've dived there.

Once there, the depth increased as we made our way around the headland as we swam from rocky outcrop to rocky outcrop to things that took our interest.

There were octopus, different leatherjackets and as we got deeper large goat fish were still in their deep red night time colours (as sunrise was just 7:00am).

At one spot there was a school of juvenile yellowtail scad midwater that was in a tight ball and as we got closer you could see a juvenile kingfish swimming through the school As they were all small juveniles it would be easy to jump to the conclusion that they were all huge! Hopefully they'll survive & grow to become more impressive...

We ambled along till we got to 8m depth at the 45 minute mark & returned back a little shallower up the reef to avoid retracing our tracks.

Here there was a lot of the temperate encrusting stony coral here but most of it didn't have the usual fluorescent green colour.

As we hit the sand we tried a back bearing to find the reef but ended up swimming parallel to it here we found a good sized flathead.

Eventually we surfaced in the shallows halfway along the beach & took the concrete path back to the cars.

Dave generously offered assistance carrying some gear. Coffees were enjoyed before we all parted.

With the viz about 3-4m it was well worth the early start to dive Camp Cove!

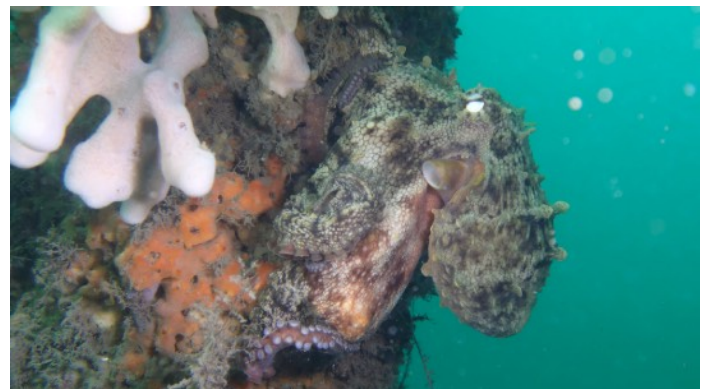


Dive Log:

Mal got the ball rolling with an email out to the club asking if anyone was interested in diving on Sunday. Since I was DAL for the weekend I put out a confirmation on Tuesday via e-mail and WhatsApp and received several responses from interested people. Later in the week a boat dive was organised which resulted in a total of 13 RUC divers going diving on the Sunday morning which shows our club has active members.



We met at Clifton Gardens at 7:30am with the aim of being in the water by 8am. High tide was forecast to be at 8:22am and with the change of tide the vis was expected to decrease. On arrival two of the seven divers decided not to dive so stayed on shore as dive support. Mal and Krystal buddied up while Richard, Clinton and I buddied together. Entering from the sand (I normally do a giant stride entry from the wharf) we swam out beside the net in the vain hope of seeing something in the shallows. We did see fish life on the sand but the net was devoid of sea creatures until we got to about four meters of depth. On the pylons I spotted my first and only sea horse. Next to him was an octopus making a nice home in a cavity on the pylon.



Throughout the rest of the dive I spotted several more octopi, cuttle fish and flutemouth

After about an hour we headed back to exit on the inside of the swimming enclosure so we could make use of the ramp leading back to the grass area. A couple of people had to head straight off after the dive while the rest of us headed over to the café on the north side of the bay for and after dive coffee.

Magic Point, April 13 - Report 1

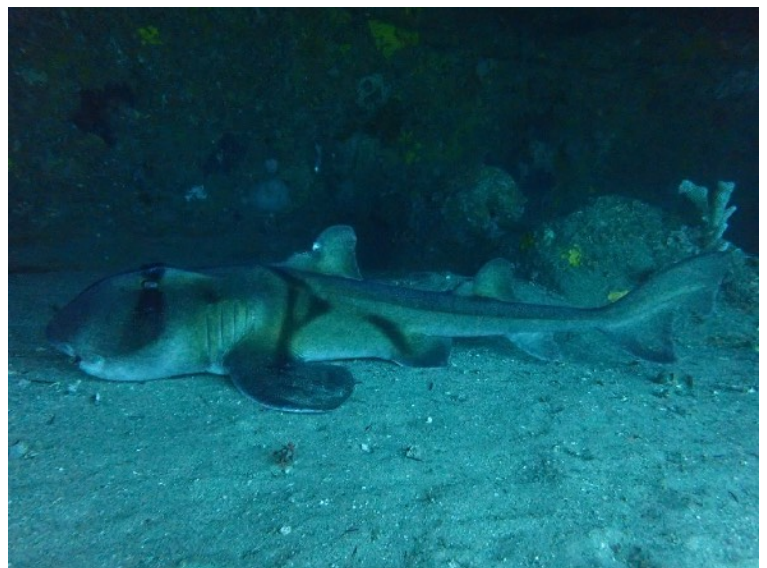

Dive Log:

It was predicted to be a beautiful day to be out in the boat so Peter started the conversation followed by Ken. By Thursday night we had a full boat. We all met at the 'container' ramp at Botany Bay and were greeted by the sounds of large aircraft cheering us on! The RUC boat got into the water without incident.

Once we got past Bare Island and out the heads, the seas started to get quite lumpy as the North Easterly swell made driving a challenge. A mutual discussion was made amongst us all and we still proceeded to Magic Point.

Upon arrival another dive boat was already there, Abyss, and had taken our spot, however, the skip-



per was friendly enough and gave us some information on where the divers were and so we anchored up approx. 50 metres to the side of Abyss.

It was decided that Ken, Nat & Peter would head in first so that we could check the anchor line at the bottom. Surprisingly, the visibility was great, and we could see all the divers down below and I just couldn't wait to see the sharks. On the bottom we found the anchor and Ken checked to see if it was secure. We gave the okay signals, followed the wall and found a nice-looking Port Jackson and some Wobbys en-route.

The cave entrance was quite murky possibly from the previous divers that had visited but sure enough we saw 2 elusive Grey Nurse sharks at the back of the cave. I couldn't get too close for a large wobby had blocked my entrance and I didn't dare touch its tail!



The current had started to turn quite strong and where we were, we hit a thermocline. I wanted to head towards the kelp beds to check for weedy sea dragons and signalled to Ken. As the current got stronger, Ken decided to head back towards the anchor and so we followed. Back past the cave and around the wall towards the anchor we found a long, thin, nylon, yellow rope heading from the shallows right to the sand. I signalled to Peter and Ken that I was going to cut it and before I could start a friendly Blue Grouper decided to entertain us for a while.



Peter decided to head back up to the boat to encourage Michael, Matt & Jordan to get ready whilst Ken & I decided to continue with the mission of cutting the thin rope. I signalled to Ken, and he decided to go towards the sand to collect the rope and I went the opposite direction. We collected a fair amount of rope (rather like a SMB reel rope type). Ken was down to 65 bar, and I still had 110 bar left, we came back up.

Michael, Matt & Jordan also found the cave afterwards and enjoyed a wider span of diving.

The seas weren't too bad coming back but as we turned the

corner to head towards Bare Island the boat engine started beeping and got louder when we picked up speed and so we had to slowly head back to the ramp.

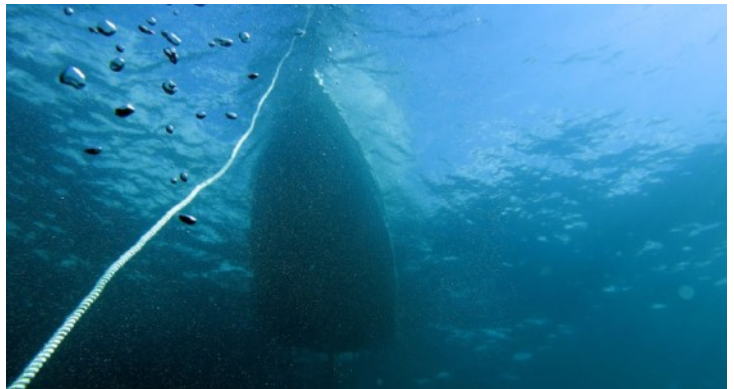
We washed the boat down at the ramp and enjoyed coffee and biscuits watching the planes take off and land. It was an enjoyable day out.



Magic Point, April 13 - Report 2

Another day dawned bright and early. Sun 13.4.2025, forecast showed a slight wind from the N.E. and a minimal sea. Sounds like a great day to do a boat dive. IT was. Peter had suggested a dive and I had the boat at my place. Guess I'm the tower. The Sharks at Magic Pt Maroubra was the destination. Meet time was 8am at The container boat ramp at Botany, a bit of a drive.

Natalie met at 6.30 my place. And off we Headed. Got some fuel at Baulkham Hills and then onto the motorway. Gosh you need a bank loan for the Tolls. We made good time and arrived at 7.40, with the others just behind me. Loaded up the boat and headed into Botany Bay, with 6 divers. I always feel like i have to duck down as the planes land low over head. Crazy I know. Heading out of the bay there were a few waves. The sea was a bit bigger than expected, but still a good sea. About 40 mins after leaving we arrive at Maroubra headland to find there is a commercial boat there. We spoke and he said he had 16 divers. That makes for hard time getting good pics, without a diver in the field of view.



Well.. we are here now let's see how this pans out. We manoeuvred to between the 2 caves and dropped anchor, no dive bubbles were evident, so we were good. It turned out to be a good spot. We had anchored off the the left of the main cave, in 14 mtrs. Michael, Matt and Jordan were happy for Peter, Nat and myself to dive first to confirm our closeness to the cave. We were spot on.

The vis initially was good at 10 mtrs. We could see the rock face to the left of the cave from the anchor, and actually from the surface, in the water. We headed down the anchor and checked it was set properly and then headed west following the wall to the cave.

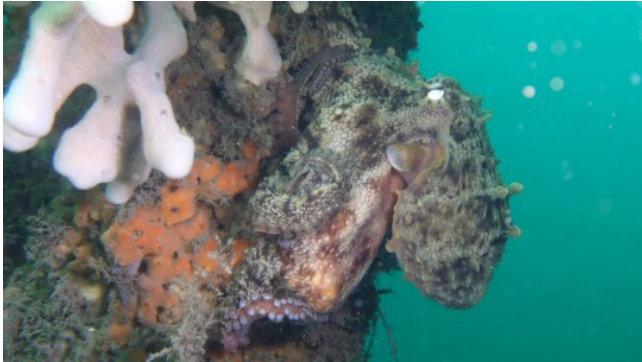


Out the front was a large Wobbegong just resting on the sand and another close by. The cave looked empty, but was surrounded by thousands of smaller yellow tail (bait fish) fish. Fairly quickly a cooler thermo cline hit us causing the visibility and temp to drop considerably.

If we swam closer to the cave mouth from one side, so as not to corner the sharks, we could see that there were 3 sharks swimming along the rear wall. They would have been a good 5 ft long, but moved gracefully. An amazing sight to see. We watched for awhile and then moved onto the second cave to see if there were more sharks. The cave was empty, but for more of the yellow tail smaller fish. Along the way we saw more Wobbegong and some Port Jackson sharks. The Blue Grouper were a common sight. One rather large Grouper was very active, possibly seeking a feed.

We returned to the anchor and Peter surfaced first. Nat and I had 5 more mins near the anchor, eventually surfacing after our 5 min safety stop. Michael, Matt and Jordan were ready to go in. We confirmed where they should head and off they went for their dive. About 40 mins later they surfaced away from the boat. We pulled the anchor and headed to pick them up. We then headed back South to Botany Bay and the boat ramp. On the way back, the outboard motor didn't run smoothly. We slowed and continued back successfully. We Washed the boat down and headed home. A great day and Dive was had, unfortunately we missed our coffee stop due to the slow run back.
